The teacher, along with the students, (a)/ were planning (b)/ a surprise for the principal's birthday (c)/. No error (d).

Question 2

Neither the manager nor the employees (a)/ was aware (b)/ of the changes in the policy (c)/. No error (d).



Question 3

The committee are (a)/ divided in their opinions about (b)/ the proposed reforms (c)/. No error (d).

Question 4

She has lived here (a)/ since five years (b)/ and knows everyone in the neighborhood (c)/. No error (d).



Question 5

The news that he was quitting (a)/ his job were (b)/ surprising to everyone (c)/. No error (d).

Question 6

Hardly had the train left (a)/ the station when (b)/ it started raining heavily (c)/. No error (d).



Question 7

The number of students (a)/ in the class are (b)/ increasing every year (c)/. No error (d).

Question 8

If I was (a)/ the Prime Minister, I would focus (b)/ on education reforms (c)/. No error (d).



Question 9

Everyone of the students (a)/ have submitted (b)/ their assignments on time (c)/. No error (d).

Question 10

No sooner the movie started (a)/ than the crowd began (b)/ to cheer loudly (c)/. No error (d).



Question 11

One of my friends (a)/ have gone to (b)/ the United States for higher studies (c)/. No error (d).

Question 12

Neither of the two candidates (a)/ were suitable for (b)/ the managerial position (c)/. No error (d).



Question 13

The furniture in the room (a)/ are very old and (b)/ need to be replaced soon (c)/. No error (d).

Question 14

The man, along with his dogs, (a)/ have gone for a walk (b)/ in the park (c)/. No error (d).



Question 15

He is one of those players (a)/ who has always performed (b)/ consistently under pressure (c)/. No error (d).



ANSWER WITH EXPLANATION



1. (b) were planning

Correction: was planning

Explanation: The subject *teacher* is singular, and the phrase *along* with the students is additional information. The verb must agree with the singular subject.

2. (b) was aware

Correction: were aware

Explanation: When subjects are connected by *neither...nor*, the verb agrees with the nearest subject. Here, *employees* is plural, so the verb should be *were*.



3. (a) are

Correction: is

Explanation: Committee is a collective noun and is treated as singular when it acts as a single entity.

4. (b) since five years

Correction: for five years

Explanation: Since is used to refer to a specific point in time, while for is used for a duration.



5. (b) were

Correction: was

Explanation: The subject *news* is singular and requires a singular verb.

6. (*d*) No error

Explanation: The sentence is correct. The construction *hardly...when* is grammatically accurate.



7. *(b)* are

Correction: *is*

Explanation: The number is treated as singular and requires a singular verb.

8. (a) was

Correction: were

Explanation: In conditional sentences that express hypothetical situations, were is used instead of was.



9. (b) have submitted

Correction: has submitted

Explanation: Everyone is singular and takes a singular verb.

10. (a) No sooner the movie started

Correction: No sooner had the movie started

Explanation: The correct structure is *No sooner had...than.*



11. (b) have gone

Correction: has gone

Explanation: The subject one of my friends is singular and requires a

singular verb.

12. (b) were suitable

Correction: was suitable

Explanation: Neither is singular and requires a singular verb.

13. (b) are very old

Correction: is very old

Explanation: Furniture is an uncountable noun and is always treated as

singular.

14. (b) have gone

Correction: has gone

Explanation: The subject man is singular, and the verb must agree with it.

15. (b) who has always performed

Correction: who have always performed

Explanation: The relative pronoun who refers to players, which is plural.

Therefore, the verb should be have.
